Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance High-Yield Bond Fund (the *Fund*) seeks to generate a high level of current income, primarily through investment in high-yield, corporate bonds from issuers around the world and, where consistent with this objective, will also seek capital appreciation.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests primarily in high-yield corporate bonds from around the world, but may also invest in other investments such as preferred shares, common shares, or income trusts.

Risk

The Fund is a high-yield bond fund suitable for investors who can tolerate low to moderate investment risk.

Global capital markets experienced high levels of volatility over the period as a result of the economic recession that started the period and the subsequent recovery phase which took place over the latter half of the period. The first three months of the period were marked, in particular, by the sudden collapse of several large U.S. financial institutions that resulted in mergers, bankruptcy, or the sale of a substantial number of shares to the U.S. government and other investors. These events led to an erosion of investor confidence and a temporary seizing of credit and money markets. As confidence in global financial markets diminished, governments around the world responded with frequent cash infusions to add temporary liquidity and work to unlock credit markets. These events had a direct impact on global equity and fixed income markets and, as a result, the potential general market risk to the Fund was increased at the onset of the period. In the latter half of the period, global capital markets experienced the beginning phases of a recovery and equity markets delivered much improved returns as investor confidence began to shift back to riskier asset classes. The markets continued to experience ripples as investors remained cautious but significant advances were made over the

third and fourth quarters to return a sizeable portion of the losses incurred at the start of the period.

Despite the above-mentioned risk factors, the overall risk level of the Fund was not significantly impacted. The risk level of the Fund continues to be as described in the Fund's simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The portfolio sub-advisor of the Fund is CIBC Global Asset Management Inc. (*CIBC Global*). The commentary that follows reflects the views of CIBC Global and provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2009. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

- The Fund's net asset value increased by 36% during the period, from \$185,923 as at August 31, 2008 to \$253,753 as at August 31, 2009. Net sales of \$69,427 contributed to the increase in net asset value, which was partially offset by negative investment performance.
- High-yield bond prices dropped significantly in the fourth quarter of 2008, but recovered substantially between March and August of 2009 as credit conditions improved and market demand for new high-yield issues increased. As investors became more comfortable buying high-yield assets, the lowest rated bonds ('CCC' and lower) outperformed other rating categories.
- Factors that positively contributed to Fund performance were its underweight in several bonds, Bell Mobility Inc. and Sherritt International Corp., among others, which experienced large price declines. The Fund also benefited from an overweight in 'CCC' and lower rated issues.
- The Fund's investment objectives changed from Canadian to global in December 2008. More U.S. issues were added, especially during the second quarter of 2009, as the high-yield market began to improve. The Fund added Regal Cinemas Inc., a chain of movie theatres that is profiting from increased

attendance during the recession, and Corrections Corporation of America, a prison developer that will benefit from the outsourcing of detention services by the U.S. government.

- To match the new global benchmark, CIBC Global reduced the U.S. currency hedges, leaving the Fund more exposed to U.S. dollar movements. This change negatively affected performance over the last six months, as the Canadian dollar strengthened against the U.S. dollar.
- The Fund held three issues that defaulted during the year: Bally Total Fitness Holding Corp., due to a decline in consumer spending; Nortel Networks Corporation, due to reduced capital spending; and General Motors Ltd., which was forced to restructure by the U.S. government. The majority of the Fund's holdings have very limited refinancing requirements in the near term, which should enable these issuers to avoid default.
- At the end of the reporting period, Moody's Investor Service (*Moody's*) is forecasting a peak in the U.S. corporate default rate of about 13% in the fourth quarter of 2009 with a decline to around 4% in the fourth quarter of 2010. This compares favourably to a previous Moody's forecast of approximately 16% for the fourth quarter of 2009. A lower default rate could translate into higher returns for high-yield bonds, if investors require lower risk return for these issues. The Fund could benefit from both higher high-yield bond prices and fewer defaults for issues held.

Recent Developments

On December 1, 2008, the investment objective of the Fund was revised to allow the portfolio sub-advisor to increase foreign content primarily through investment in high-yield corporate bonds from issuers around the world. This change offers the portfolio sub-advisor additional flexibility to seize opportunities outside of Canada. To better reflect the revised investment objective, the name of the Fund was also changed from Renaissance Canadian High Yield Bond Fund to Renaissance High-Yield Bond Fund. As a result of the revised investment objective, the allocation to U.S. fixed income has increased.

Accounting Policy Change

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (*CICA*) issued *CICA Handbook Section 3862, Financial Instruments – Disclosures (Section 3862)*, and *CICA Handbook Section 3863, Financial Instruments – Presentation (Section 3863)*, effective for fiscal years beginning on or after October 1, 2007. These policies provide comprehensive disclosure and presentation requirements for financial instruments. Section 3862 replaces the disclosure portion of *CICA Handbook Section 3861, Financial Instruments – Disclosure and Presentation (Section 3861)*, and introduces new requirements for specific qualitative and quantitative disclosure about risks. Section 3863, carries forward the presentation requirements from Section 3861, unchanged. This includes the requirements to quantify exposures for certain risks and provide sensitivity analysis on some risks. The objective of these policies is to enable investors

to evaluate the significance of financial instruments, the nature and extent of risks involved, and how the risks are managed. On September 1, 2008, the Fund adopted these standards retroactively, without restatement of prior period financial statements, in accordance with their transitional provisions. The adoption of these standards did not have an impact on net assets, increase (decrease) in net assets from operations, or increase (decrease) in net assets from operations per unit of the Fund.

Effective January 1, 2009, the Fund adopted, retrospectively without restatement, the *CICA Emerging Issues Committee Abstract EIC-173, Credit Risk and the Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities (EIC-173)*. *EIC-173* requires the Fund's own credit risk and the credit risk of the counterparties to be taken into account in determining the fair value of financial assets and liabilities, including derivative instruments. The adoption of *EIC-173* did not have a material impact on the financial position or results of operations of the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (*CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CIBC Asset Management Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of *CIBC*, is the manager, trustee, and portfolio advisor of the Fund (*CAMI* or the *Manager*). *CAMI* will receive management fees with respect to the day-to-day business and operations of the Fund, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund, as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*. As portfolio advisor, *CAMI* provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. *CAMI* will also compensate its wholesalers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, *CAMI* may provide seed capital to the Fund.

Portfolio Sub-Advisor

CAMI has retained *CIBC Global*, a wholly-owned subsidiary of *CIBC*, as the portfolio sub-advisor of the Fund, to provide investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. A portion of the management fees *CAMI* receives from the Fund will be paid to *CIBC Global*.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms will sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms will include *CIBC's* related dealers such as the *CIBC Investor's Edge* discount brokerage division of *CIBC Investor Services Inc. (CIBC ISI)*, the *CIBC Imperial Service* division of *CIBC ISI*, and the *CIBC Wood Gundy* division of *CIBC World Markets Inc. (CIBC WM)*. *CIBC ISI* and *CIBC WM* are wholly-owned subsidiaries of *CIBC*.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

Portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by portfolio sub-advisors, including CIBC Global, to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and other securities to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may also furnish research, statistical, and other services to portfolio sub-advisors, including CIBC Global, that process trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements). These services assist portfolio sub-advisors with investment decision making services to the Fund. As per the terms of the sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws. In addition, CAMI may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may purchase and sell securities of CIBC. The Fund may also, from time to time, purchase securities underwritten by a related dealer, such as CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp., each an affiliate of the Manager. Such transactions are currently made pursuant to standing instructions rendered by the Independent Review Committee.

Custodian

The custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian may be holding. CIBC is the custodian of the Fund (the *Custodian*). The Custodian may hire sub-custodians for the Fund. The fees for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (*CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including fund accounting and reporting, securities lending, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a fifty percent interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays one or more annual management fees to CAMI in consideration for the provision of, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. These fees are calculated as a percentage of the Fund's class level net asset value and are calculated and credited daily, and paid monthly. The Fund is required to pay Goods and Services Tax (GST) on the management fees.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended August 31, 2009. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses. CAMI charges a management fee directly to investors in class O units.

Past Performance

The performance data provided assumes reinvestment of distributions only and does not take into account sales, redemption, distribution, or other optional charges payable by any unitholder that would have reduced returns. Past performance does not necessarily indicate how a fund will perform in the future.

The Fund's primary benchmark, the DEX High Yield Bond Index (the *primary benchmark*), has been published since 1994, and is designed to be a broad measure of the Canadian non-investment grade fixed income market, which includes securities rated less than 'BBB (low)' but greater than 'D'. Returns are calculated daily and are weighted by market capitalization.

During the period, the Fund's secondary benchmark was changed to better reflect the change to the Fund's investment objective. As a result, the Fund's secondary benchmark is a blended index consisting of a 70% weighting in the Merrill Lynch US Cash Pay High Yield Constrained Index (50% Hedged in CAD) and a 30% weighting in the Merrill Lynch CAD and USD High Yield, Canadian Issuers Index (100% hedged in CAD) (*blended benchmark*). The Merrill Lynch US Cash Pay High Yield Constrained Index (50% Hedged in CAD) contains all of the securities in the Merrill Lynch US Cash Pay High Yield Index but caps issuer exposure at 2%. Index constituents are capitalization-weighted, based on their current amount outstanding, provided the total allocation to an individual issuer does not exceed 2%. The Merrill Lynch CAD and USD High Yield, Canadian Issuers Index tracks the performance of USD and CAD denominated below investment grade corporate debt publicly issued by Canadian issuers in the Canadian or U.S. domestic markets. Qualifying securities must have a below investment grade rating (based on a composite of Moody's, S&P and Fitch) and the country of risk must be Canada.

The Fund's previous secondary benchmark is a blended index consisting of a 70% weighting in the DEX High Yield Bond Index and a 30% weighting in the Merrill Lynch U.S. High Yield, Cash Pay Constrained Index (*previous blended benchmark*). 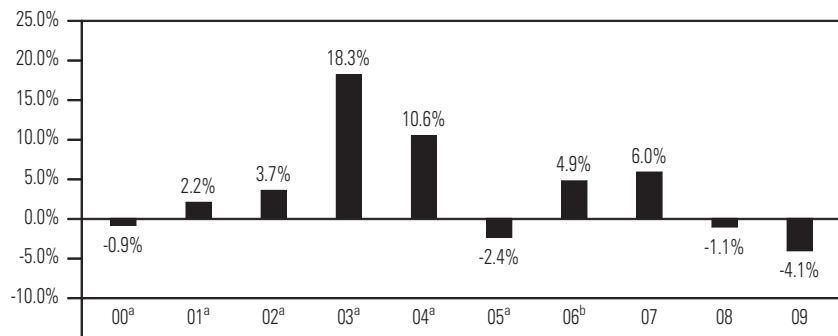
For the period, Class A, Class F, and Class O units of the Fund returned -4.1%, -3.4%, and -2.3%, respectively. Class A, Class F, and Class O units underperformed the primary benchmark, the blended benchmark, and the previous blended benchmark returns of 6.0%, 1.5%, and 5.7%, respectively.

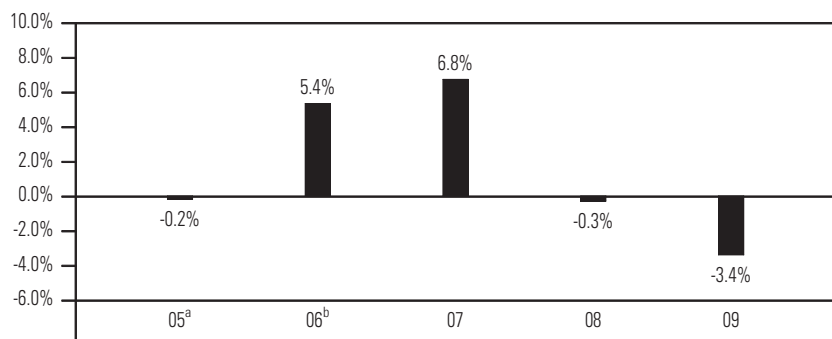
Class A Units

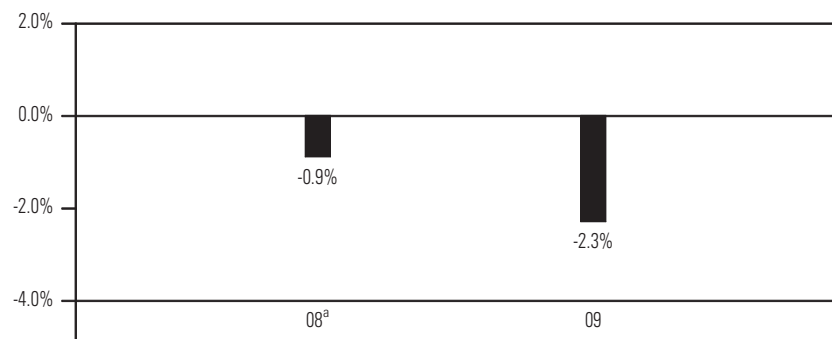
Class F Units
