

## Annual Management Report of Fund Performance

for the financial year ended August 31, 2009

### Management Discussion of Fund Performance

#### Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance Short-Term Income Fund (the *Fund*) seeks to obtain a high level of income consistent with security of capital through investments primarily in securities issued or guaranteed by the Government of Canada or one of the provinces thereof, municipal or school corporations in Canada, and in first mortgages on properties situated in Canada, interest-bearing deposits of banks or trust companies, and high quality corporate bonds.

Investment Strategies: The Fund is positioned based on average term-to-maturity and security selection. Adjustments to the portfolio will be based on the portfolio sub-advisor's review of economic conditions both inside and outside of North America, along with detailed issuer credit reviews.

#### Risk

The Fund is a Canadian short-term fixed income fund that is suitable for short to medium term investors who can tolerate low investment risk.

Global capital markets experienced high levels of volatility over the period as a result of the economic recession that started the period and the subsequent recovery phase which took place over the latter half of the period. The first three months of the period were marked, in particular, by the sudden collapse of several large U.S. financial institutions that resulted in mergers, bankruptcy, or the sale of a substantial number of shares to the U.S. government and other investors. These events led to an erosion of investor confidence and a temporary seizing of credit and money markets. As confidence in global financial markets diminished, governments around the world responded with frequent cash infusions to add temporary liquidity and work to unlock credit markets. These events had a direct impact on global equity and fixed income markets and, as a result, the potential general market risk to the Fund was increased at the onset of the period. In the latter half of

the period, global capital markets experienced the beginning phases of a recovery and equity markets delivered much improved returns as investor confidence began to shift back to riskier asset classes. The markets continued to experience ripples as investors remained cautious but significant advances were made over the third and fourth quarters to return a sizeable portion of the losses incurred at the start of the period.

Despite the above-mentioned risk factors, the overall risk level of the Fund was not significantly impacted. The risk level of the Fund continues to be as described in the Fund's simplified prospectus.

#### Results of Operations

The portfolio sub-advisor of the Fund is CIBC Global Asset Management Inc. (*CIBC Global*). The commentary that follows reflects the views of CIBC Global and provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2009. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

- The Fund's net asset value increased by 52% during the period, from \$31,084 as at August 31, 2008 to \$47,211 as at August 31, 2009. Net sales of \$14,712 contributed to the increase in net asset value, which was aided by positive investment performance.
- The credit market stress that crippled the financial system since the summer of 2007 reached a climax during the past year. Government intervention to support financial institutions helped to relieve the crisis and investors regained some confidence in the renewed stability of financial markets and the brighter outlook of the economy. Beginning in the second quarter of 2009, high-yield assets such as corporate bonds and equities rallied substantially. Risk-free government bonds also performed well despite concerns about increased issuance and inflation potential in the medium term.

- The Fund's sector exposure within government holdings and the industry exposure within corporate holdings detracted from performance. Within the corporate sector, the portfolio was underweight in financial issues, which was one of the best performing industry groups, and overweight in high quality commercial mortgage-backed securities (CMBS) and asset-backed securities (ABS), which lagged the market.
- During the period, CIBC Global decreased the allocation to corporate bonds to minimize the negative effect from declining corporate bond prices. CIBC Global also increased the Fund's allocation to Government of Canada bonds. Overall, CIBC Global remains underweight in the government sector to keep the portfolio's yield greater than that of the Fund's benchmark, the DEX Short Term Bond Index (the *benchmark*).
- CIBC Global kept the term-to-maturity of the portfolio longer than that of the benchmark for most of the period because central banks were reducing and maintaining key short-term interest rates at historic lows.
- In CIBC Global's view, the de-leveraging process that consumers and financial institutions are experiencing will be long and will act as a drag on economic growth. In this economic climate, central banks will likely keep administered rates near historic lows. However, CIBC Global will carefully adjust the Fund's term-to-maturity if central banks begin to increase rates from present levels.

#### Recent Developments

On December 1, 2008, the name of the Fund was changed from Renaissance Canadian Income Fund to Renaissance Short-Term Income Fund to better reflect the investment objective and strategies of the Fund.

#### Accounting Policy Change

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) issued CICA Handbook Section 3862, *Financial Instruments – Disclosures (Section 3862)*, and CICA Handbook Section 3863, *Financial Instruments – Presentation (Section 3863)*, effective for fiscal years beginning on or after October 1, 2007. These policies provide comprehensive disclosure and presentation requirements for financial instruments. Section 3862 replaces the disclosure portion of CICA Handbook Section 3861, *Financial Instruments – Disclosure and Presentation (Section 3861)*, and introduces new requirements for specific qualitative and quantitative disclosure about risks. Section 3863, carries forward the presentation requirements from Section 3861, unchanged. This includes the requirements to quantify exposures for certain risks and provide sensitivity analysis on some risks. The objective of these policies is to enable investors to evaluate the significance of financial instruments, the nature and extent of risks involved, and how the risks are managed. On September 1, 2008, the Fund adopted these standards retroactively, without restatement of prior period financial statements, in accordance with their transitional provisions. The adoption of these standards did not have an impact on net assets, increase

(decrease) in net assets from operations, or increase (decrease) in net assets from operations per unit of the Fund.

Effective January 1, 2009, the Fund adopted, retrospectively without restatement, the CICA Emerging Issues Committee Abstract EIC-173, Credit Risk and the Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities (*EIC-173*). EIC-173 requires the Fund's own credit risk and the credit risk of the counterparties to be taken into account in determining the fair value of financial assets and liabilities, including derivative instruments. The adoption of EIC-173 did not have a material impact on the financial position or results of operations of the Fund.

#### Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

##### *Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund*

CIBC Asset Management Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the manager, trustee, and portfolio advisor of the Fund (CAMI or the *Manager*). CAMI will receive management fees with respect to the day-to-day business and operations of the Fund, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund, as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*. As portfolio advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI will also compensate its wholesalers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may provide seed capital to the Fund.

##### *Portfolio Sub-Advisor*

CAMI has retained CIBC Global, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, as the portfolio sub-advisor of the Fund, to provide investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. A portion of the management fees CAMI receives from the Fund will be paid to CIBC Global.

##### *Distributor*

Dealers and other firms will sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms will include CIBC's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (*CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (*CIBC WM*). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

*Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars*

Portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by portfolio sub-advisors, including CIBC Global, to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and other securities to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may also furnish research, statistical, and other services to portfolio sub-advisors, including CIBC Global, that process trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements). These services assist portfolio sub-advisors with investment decision making services to the Fund. As per the terms of the sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws. In addition, CAMI may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets

Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

*Fund Transactions*

The Fund may purchase and sell securities of CIBC. The Fund may also, from time to time, purchase securities underwritten by a related dealer, such as CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp., each an affiliate of the Manager. Such transactions are currently made pursuant to standing instructions rendered by the Independent Review Committee.

*Custodian*

The custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian may be holding. CIBC is the custodian of the Fund (the *Custodian*). The Custodian may hire sub-custodians for the Fund. The fees for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis.

*Service Provider*

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (*CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including fund accounting and reporting, securities lending, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a fifty percent interest in CIBC GSS.

### Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays one or more annual management fees to CAMI in consideration for the provision of, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. These fees are calculated as a percentage of the Fund's class level net asset value and are calculated and credited daily, and paid monthly. The Fund is required to pay Goods and Services Tax (GST) on the management fees.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended August 31, 2009. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

### Past Performance

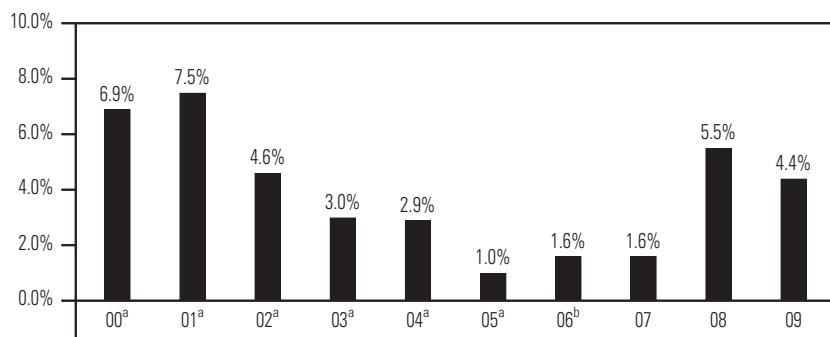
For the period, Class A and Class F units of the Fund returned 4.4% and 5.0%, respectively. Class A and Class F units underperformed the benchmark return of 7.4% for the same period.

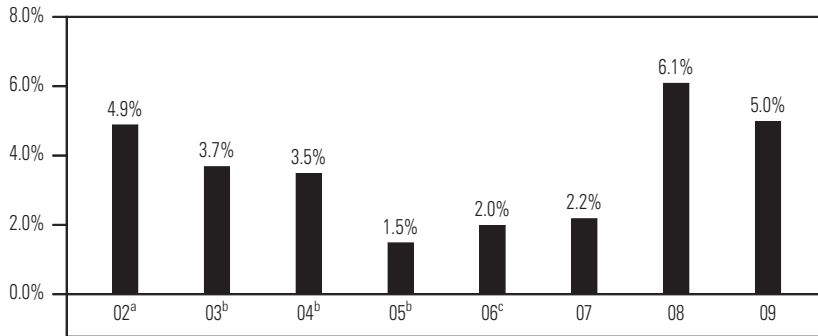
#### Class A Units
