Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

Renaissance Canadian Balanced Fund's (the *Fund*) portfolio advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (*CAMI*, the *Manager*, or *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the six-month period ended February 28, 2025. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 1% during the period, from \$113,910 as at August 31, 2024 to \$114,648 as at February 28, 2025. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$7,912, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 7.7% for the period. The Fund's primary benchmarks, the FTSE Canada Universe Overall Bond Index and the S&P/TSX Composite Index (the *primary benchmarks*), returned 4.2% and 10.3%, respectively, for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the primary benchmarks' return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

The Bank of Canada lowered interest rates twice over the period. At the end of the period, the market was anticipating two additional rate cuts by the end of 2025 based on the potential need to support the economy in the face of tariffs imposed by the U.S. The U.S. Federal Reserve Board was expected to lower interest rates at least twice in 2025 as a result of weaker economic data. Potential tariffs and the consequent inflationary pressures clouded the economic outlook.

The Canadian equity market rose, buoyed by strong performance in the information technology, financials, materials and energy sectors. This reflected a stable economy with falling inflation, relatively steady employment, resilient consumer spending and declining interest rates.

The outlook for the Canadian equity market changed significantly in response to the threat of tariffs on Canadian goods, including energy. The prospect of a protracted trade conflict increased the risks of higher inflation, slower demand for Canadian exports, higher unemployment and weaker consumer sentiment. The Canadian dollar fell by 8% relative to the U.S. dollar in the first two months of 2025, while the price of gold increased by 8.6%.

North American bond yields fell as inflation continued to decline. Bond markets were also affected by potentially inflationary policies from the new U.S. administration, which led longer-term bond yields to rise. Canadian bonds outperformed U.S. bonds, partially as a result of Canada's greater progress with normalizing inflation. Corporate bonds outperformed government bonds as credit spreads (the difference in yield between corporate and government bonds of similar maturity) narrowed, reflecting strong demand for higher-risk assets and better-than-anticipated corporate profitability.

Within the Fund's equity component, an overweight allocation to the energy sector detracted from performance as Canadian oil and gas equities weakened. The price of oil declined over the period, and concerns increased surrounding the U.S. government's intent to apply tariffs to energy imports. Security selection in the information technology and health care sectors also detracted from performance.

An overweight holding in Capital Power Corp. detracted from performance as the DeepSeek market event in late January caused an approximate 20% decline in the stock. A holding in Novo Nordisk AS detracted from performance after the company reported disappointing clinical trial results for one of its new therapies under development.

An underweight allocation to the communication services sector contributed to performance. An ongoing pricing battle, unfavourable regulatory environment and slowdown in immigration weighed on the telecommunications industry. Stock selection within the consumer discretionary, energy and communication services sectors also contributed to performance.

Overweight holdings in Agnico Eagle Mines Ltd. and Kinross Gold Corp. contributed to performance as these stocks rose with the sharp increase in the price of gold. An underweight holding in BCE Inc. also contributed to performance as the telecommunications industry underperformed amid competitive pressures and weak demand. Other individual contributors to performance included Netflix Inc. and Safran SA. Netflix Inc. reported better-than-expected subscriber growth, while Safran SA reported stronger-than-expected results.

In the Fund's fixed income component, individual detractors from performance included underweight holdings in Government of Canada

(GoC) (1.50%, 2031/06/01, 1.50%, 2031/12/01 and 4.00%, 2029/03/01), which were negatively affected by declining yields.

Overweight exposure to corporate bonds contributed to performance, as did exposure to high-yield bonds and U.S. mortgage-backed securities. Holdings in GoC (2.75%, 2055/12/01) and Province of Ontario (2.90%, 2046/12/02) contributed to performance, as these bonds benefited from their longer terms to maturity.

The Portfolio Advisor added a new equity holding in Atkinsrealis Group Inc. for its opportunity in nuclear growth. The Fund's exposure to midstream and utilities companies was increased with new holdings in Brookfield Renewable Partners L.P., Capital Power Corp. and Gibson Energy Inc. A new equity holding in Allegion PLC, a leading supplier of access controls in commercial and residential end markets, was also added to the Fund.

An existing holding in Agnico Eagle Mines Ltd. was increased to raise the Fund's exposure to gold. The company is a high-quality operator with low geopolitical risk. Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce was increased for its improving operating results. The Toronto-Dominion Bank was increased as the company addressed its anti-money laundering issues and replaced its CEO to position itself for recovery.

A holding in Barrick Gold Corp. was reduced given its operating issues, including difficulties in Mali. Canadian Natural Resources Ltd. was trimmed given its exposure to energy tariffs imposed by the U.S. The Portfolio Advisor also trimmed AltaGas Ltd., Constellation Software Inc., Netflix Inc. and Costco Wholesale Corp., among other holdings, to take profits.

In fixed income, an investment-grade bond issued by Noverco Inc. was added to the Fund for its attractive price. Royal Bank of Canada (5.10%, 2029/04/09) was increased for additional yield. U.S. Foods Inc. (4.75%, 2029/02/15) was sold in favour of U.S. mortgage-backed securities to increase the Fund's credit quality at an equivalent yield. The Portfolio Advisor trimmed Enbridge Inc. (5.32%, 2054/08/02) to reduce exposure to longer-term bonds.

Recent Developments

The level of geopolitical risk disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. Threatened and actual impositions of tariffs and other trade-related actions by the U.S., China and other global actors, and any counter-tariff and non-tariff retaliatory measures by Canada, Europe and others, may have further negative impacts on the Canadian and global economy, and on financial markets. These events could exacerbate other preexisting political, social and economic risks and cause substantial market volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses and financial markets. These factors may adversely affect the Fund's performance. The Manager continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*.

The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain fund costs) in respect of the classes of units of the Fund (except Class O unit), which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Fund paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with respect to those classes of units. For Class O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) allocated to Class O units of the Fund. The fixed administration fee payable by the Fund, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Fund.

As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (CIBC ISI), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (CIBC WM). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) when they process trades through them. These types of goods and services for which the Portfolio Advisor or a portfolio sub-advisor may direct brokerage commissions are research goods and services and order execution goods and services, and are referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements. These goods and services received through soft dollar arrangements assist the Portfolio Advisor or any portfolio sub-advisor(s) with investment decision-making services for the Fund, or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio advisory agreement and portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$3,745 to CIBC WM; the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (*inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has

been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager in exchange for the Fund charging a Fixed Administration Fee. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

The Custodian also provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. The Manager receives fixed administration fee from the Fund, in return, the Manager pays certain operating expenses which includes custodial fees (including all applicable taxes) and the fees for fund accounting, reporting, and fund valuation (including all applicable taxes) to the Custodian. Where applicable, securities lending fees are applied against the revenue received by the Fund.

⁵ Management expense ratio is based on the total expenses of the fund (excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs), incurred by or allocated to a class of units for the period shown, expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value of that class during the period. The management expense ratio includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds.

⁶ The decision to waive management fees and/or fixed administration fees is at the discretion of the Manager. The practice of waiving management fees and/or fixed administration fees may continue indefinitely or may be terminated at any time without notice to unitholders. The management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds, where applicable.

⁷ The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs before income taxes expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value during the period. Spreads associated with fixed income securities trading are not ascertainable and, for that reason, are not included in the trading expense ratio calculation. Previously, the trading expense ratio included the fees attributable to exchange traded funds which are now no longer included in the TER. Prior year fees attributable to exchange traded funds have been reclassified to the management expense ratio and management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions.

⁸ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the portfolio advisor and/or portfolio sub-advisor manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to a fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by a fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.




Past Performance
