What does the fund invest in?

The fund invests primarily in a global fixed income fund that invests in a diversified portfolio of non-Canadian dollar fixed income instruments of varying maturities and/or directly in fixed income securities.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CIBC Asset Management Inc. has rated the volatility of this fund as Low.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It does not tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

How has the fund performed?

YEAR-BY-YEAR RETURNS

This chart shows how Series S units of the fund performed in the past calendar year. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



BEST AND WORST 3-MONTH RETURNS

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series S units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past calendar year. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

AVERAGE RETURN

The annual compounded return of Series S units of the fund since July 5, 2022 was 4.0%. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund on July 5, 2022, your investment would be worth \$1,081 as at June 30, 2024.

Who is this fund for?	A word about tax
 Investors who: are seeking income with a moderate degree of capital growth; and are investing for the medium to long term. 	In general, you will have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).
	Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered plan, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own, and sell Series S units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. SALES CHARGES

There are no sales charges payable when you buy, switch, or sell Series S units of the fund.

2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As at December 31, 2023, the expenses for Series S units of the fund were 0.59% of its value. This equals \$5.90 for every \$1,000 invested.

Management expense ratio (MER) This is the total of the fund's management fee (including the trailing commission), fixed administration fee, and any operating expenses not covered by the fixed administration fee (fund costs) for Series S units of the fund. No trailing commission is paid in respect of Series S units.

3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch, or convert units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	If you sell units of the fund to buy units of another fund managed by us or our affiliates, you may pay a switch fee of up to 2% of the value of units you switch. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
Conversion fee	If you convert units of the fund to another series of units of the same fund, you may pay a conversion fee of up to 2% of the value of units you convert. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
