What does the fund invest in?

The fund invests primarily in companies throughout the world that are involved in the development, application, production, or distribution of scientific and technology-based products and services.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CIBC has rated the volatility of this fund as **Medium to High**.

Because this is a new fund, the risk rating is only an estimate by CIBC. Generally, the rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It does not tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

No guarantees

Like most mutual funds, this fund does not have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Class S units of the fund have performed. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- are seeking exposure to innovative companies in the technology sector; and
- are investing for the long term.

A word about tax

In general, you will have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered plan, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own, and sell Class S units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among classes of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. SALES CHARGES

There are no sales charges payable when you buy, switch, or sell Class S units of the fund.

2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

The fund's expenses are made up of the management fee, fixed administration fee, any operating expenses not covered by the fixed administration fee (fund costs), and trading costs. The Class S annual management fee is 0.05% and the fixed administration fee is 0.02% of the class' value. Because this class is new, the fund costs and trading costs are not yet available.

More about the trailing commission

No trailing commission is paid in respect of Class S units.

3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch, or convert units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Switch fee	If you sell units of the fund to buy units of another fund, you may pay a switch fee of up to 2% of the value of units you switch through a representative's firm other than CIBC Securities Inc. or CIBC Investor Services Inc. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
Conversion fee	If you convert units of the fund to another class of units of the same fund, you may pay a conversion fee of up to 2% of the value of units you convert through a representative's firm other than CIBC Securities Inc. or CIBC Investor Services Inc. This fee goes to your representative's firm.
