What does the fund invest in?

The fund invests primarily in equity securities of companies that trade in an emerging country and/or that trade in any market if the companies earn a significant amount of their annual revenue from emerging economies.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CIBC has rated the volatility of this fund as **Medium to High**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It does not tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

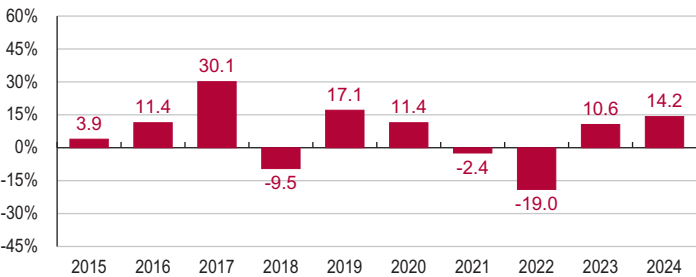
Like most mutual funds, this fund does not have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Class A units of the fund have performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

YEAR-BY-YEAR RETURNS

This chart shows how Class A units of the fund performed in each of the past 10 calendar years. Class A units dropped in value in 3 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



BEST AND WORST 3-MONTH RETURNS

This table shows the best and worst returns for Class A units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 calendar years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

AVERAGE RETURN

The annual compounded return of Class A units of the fund was 5.9% over the past 10 years. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund 10 years ago, your investment would be worth \$1,771 as at December 31, 2024.

Who is this fund for?

- Investors who:
- are seeking to fulfil some of the international equity portion of a diversified portfolio;
 - are seeking the potential for higher returns from capital growth and do not require income to be generated from their investment; and
 - are investing for the very long term.

A word about tax

In general, you will have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered plan, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own, and sell Class A units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among classes of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. SALES CHARGES

There are no sales charges payable when you buy, switch, or sell units of the fund.

2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As at June 30, 2024, the expenses for Class A units of the fund were 0.60% of its value. This equals \$6.00 for every \$1,000 invested.

Expenses	Annual rate (as a % of the fund's value)
Management expense ratio (MER) This is the total of the fund's management fee (including the trailing commission) and operating expenses for Class A units of the fund. CIBC waived all of the fund's operating expenses. If it had not done so, the MER would have been higher.	0.23%
Trading expense ratio (TER) These are the fund's trading costs.	0.37%
Fund expenses	0.60%

More about the trailing commission
No trailing commission is paid in respect of Class A units.

3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch, or convert units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the value of units you sell within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to your discretionary manager.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual funds within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, Fund Facts document, or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
