

Annual Management Report of Fund Performance

Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance Canadian Monthly Income Fund (referred to as the *Fund*) seeks to generate a high level of current cash flow by investing primarily in income-producing securities including income trusts, preferred shares, common shares, and fixed income securities.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests to add value through prudent security selection based on fundamental, bottom-up analysis and through the allocation of assets between cash, fixed income instruments, and equities.

Risk

The Fund is a Canadian neutral balanced fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate low to medium investment risk.

For the period ended August 31, 2021, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The Fund's Portfolio Advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI*, the *Manager* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2021. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 1% during the period, from \$55,895 as at August 31, 2020 to \$56,664 as at August 31, 2021. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$5,591, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 13.8% for the period. The Fund's benchmarks, the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index and the S&P/TSX Composite Dividend Index (referred to as the *primary benchmarks*), returned -1.7% and 27.8%, respectively, for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmarks' returns. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

During the period, global equity markets remained strong, with broadly-based returns. However, second and third waves of COVID-19 infections affected the economies of several countries, albeit to differing degrees. Progress on COVID-19 vaccines was made in late 2020, leading to clearer prospects for a 2021 economic recovery. Vaccine approvals, rollouts and economic reopenings drove a recovery in cyclical stocks, primarily in the U.S., where reopening led the rest of the world. Inflationary pressures on freight, commodities and goods were driven by the economic recovery, historically low inventories and supply chain challenges.

The outcome of the U.S. presidential election in November 2020 resulted in a more progressive agenda with regards to monetary stimulus, infrastructure and climate change.

Stock selection in the industrials, health care and information technology sectors contributed to the Fund's performance. A significant underweight allocation to the materials sector and a significant overweight allocation to financials also contributed to performance.

Individual contributors to performance included overweight allocations to Ashtead Group PLC, ASML Holding NV and MSCI Inc. The performance of all three stocks was driven by the economic recovery. An overweight holding in George Weston Ltd. contributed to performance, as its stock price rose after it decided to sell its bakery business. Overweight exposure to real estate investment trusts, specifically H&R REIT and Cominar REIT, contributed to performance as rent collections improved.

Security selection in the consumer discretionary, communication services and materials sectors detracted from the Fund's performance. A slight underweight allocation to the information technology sector also detracted from performance.

Individual detractors from the Fund's performance included overweight allocation to Las Vegas Sands Corp. and Newmont Corp., and moderate underweight exposure to NVIDIA Corp. and Tesla Inc. Las Vegas Sands was negatively affected by a resurgence in COVID-19 cases in China and stringent travel regulations. Newmont's share price declined with lower gold prices. NVIDIA performed well as a result of

strong growth and demand for cryptocurrencies. Tesla benefited from improving demand for electric vehicles.

The Portfolio Advisor added a number of new holdings to the Fund during the period. Southwest Airlines Inc. was added given the expectation for a recovery in domestic travel. Ball Corp. and Lonza Group AG were purchased for their strong long-term growth prospects. Home Depot Inc. was added based on the expectation for home improvement demand, while Netflix Inc. was purchased based on the potential for subscriber growth and free cash flow.

George Weston Ltd. was added to the Fund for its attractive valuation and strong cash generation. In addition, increasing dividends from Loblaw Cos. Ltd. and Choice Properties REIT should flow to the parent company, creating the opportunity for George Weston to return additional capital to shareholders.

An existing holding in Orsted A/S was increased amid rising growth concerns and higher interest rates. The Portfolio Advisor believes there is significant long-term growth opportunity in offshore wind generation. Royal Bank of Canada was increased as capital accumulation should lead to future dividend growth. RioCan REIT was increased as rent collections and occupancy rates were stronger than anticipated.

Ross Stores Inc., Honeywell International Inc., Givaudan SA, ResMed Inc. and Eli Lilly and Co. were sold to fund other investment opportunities. CSL Ltd. was eliminated based on concerns related to plasma supply constraints driven by the pandemic. Heineken NV was sold as a result of slowing growth and operating challenges. The Portfolio Advisor sold Suzuki Motor Corp. based on environmental, social and governance concerns, as well as slowing growth in India.

Ashtead Group PLC, DSV AS and Alphabet Inc. were trimmed based on share price strength. Nutrien Ltd. was also reduced as its stock price rose.

Recent Developments

Effective September 1, 2020, CAMI assumed all portfolio management responsibilities for the Fund, replacing American Century Investment Management, Inc.

Effective September 1, 2020, the annual management fee payable was reduced from 1.50% to 1.45% in respect of Class A units of the Fund, and from 0.75% to 0.70% in respect of Class F units of the Fund.

Effective September 1, 2021, CAMI, as manager, will pay the Fund's operating expenses, other than certain expenses, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of an annual fixed rate administration fee. This fee will apply to all of the Fund's classes, other than Class O, and will be equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each class of the Fund.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions imposed by governments around the world to limit its spread have disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect the performance of the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to

the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*. As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors when they process trades through them (referred to in the industry as "soft-dollar" arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI

and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$1,031 to CIBC WM; the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (referred to as the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a "private placement" offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (referred to as *inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisors are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

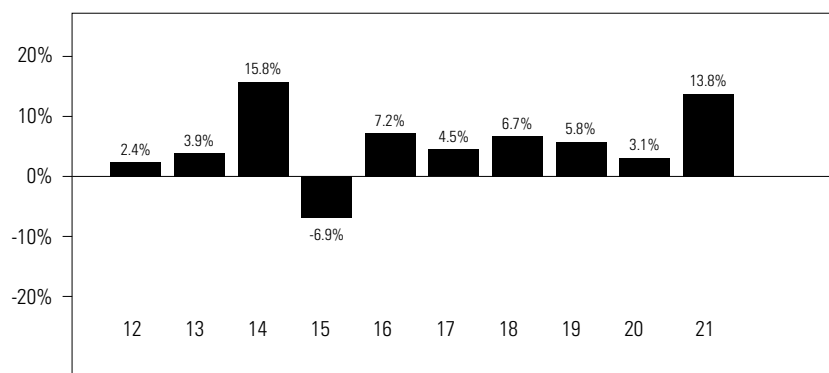

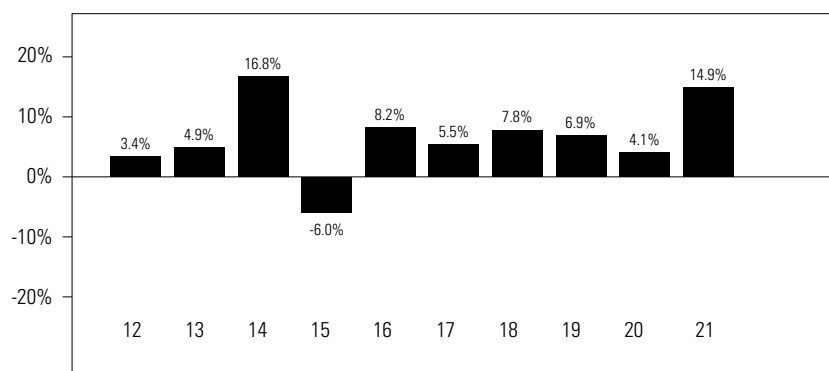
Year-by-Year Returns

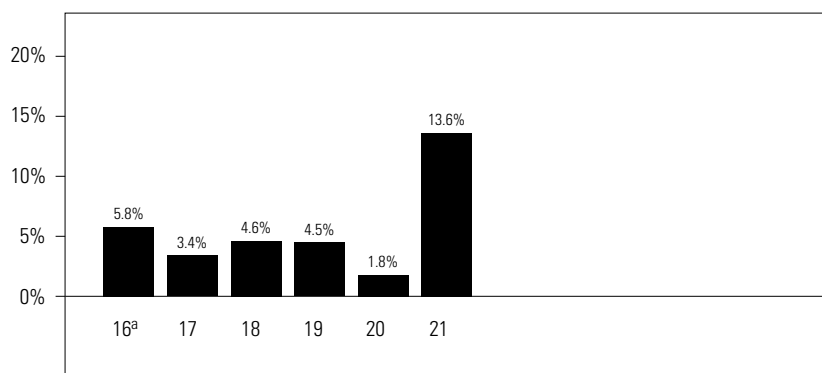
Class A Units
