

Annual Management Report of Fund Performance

Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance Global Markets Fund (referred to as the *Fund*) seeks to obtain long-term growth of capital and income by investing primarily in equity and debt securities on a worldwide basis.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests in equity securities of companies located around the world that are priced below their intrinsic value, as determined by the portfolio sub-advisor. The Fund attempts to hold a portfolio that is diversified among different sectors and geographies using multiple risk factors in relation to perceived valuation attractiveness.

Risk

The Fund is a global equity fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate medium investment risk.

For the period ended August 31, 2021, the Fund's overall level of risk remains as discussed in the simplified prospectus

Results of Operations

The Fund's Portfolio Advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI*, the *Manager* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2021. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value decreased by 5% during the period, from \$78,539 as at August 31, 2020 to \$74,343 as at August 31, 2021. Net redemptions of \$19,770 were partially offset by positive investment performance, resulting in an overall decrease in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 23.1% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the MSCI World Index (referred to as the *benchmark*), returned 26.4% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

During the period, second and third waves of COVID-19 infections affected the economies of several countries. Progress on COVID-19 vaccines was made in late 2020, leading to clearer prospects of a 2021

economic recovery on the horizon. Vaccine approvals, rollouts and economic reopenings drove a recovery in cyclical stocks, primarily in the U.S. Inflationary pressures on freight, commodities and goods were driven by the economic recovery, historically low inventories and supply chain challenges.

The U.S. presidential election in November 2020 resulted in a more progressive agenda with regard to monetary stimulus, infrastructure and climate change.

A moderate underweight allocation to the consumer discretionary sector, a significant underweight exposure to communication services and slight underweight exposure to materials detracted from the Fund's performance.

Individual detractors from the Fund's performance included a slight overweight allocation to Las Vegas Sands Corp. and moderate underweight exposure to NVIDIA Corp. and Tesla Motors Inc. Las Vegas Sands was negatively affected by a resurgence in COVID-19 cases in China and stringent travel regulations. NVIDIA performed well, driven by strong growth and demand for cryptocurrencies. Tesla benefited from improving demand for electric vehicles.

Significant overweight allocations to the industrials and health care sectors contributed to the Fund's performance, as did moderate underweight exposure to the information technology sector. The Fund's weightings in each sector is generally driven by stock selection.

Individual contributors to performance included significant overweight allocations to Ashtead Group PLC, ASML Holding NV and MSCI Inc. The performance of all three stocks was driven by an economic recovery. ASML Holding also experienced strong demand for and investment in semiconductor equipment.

The Portfolio Advisor added a number of new holdings to the Fund during the period. Southwest Airlines Inc. was added given the expectation for a recovery in domestic travel. Ball Corp. and Lonza Group AG were purchased based on strong long-term growth prospects. The Home Depot Inc. was added based on the expectation

for home improvement demand, while Netflix Inc. was purchased based on the potential for subscriber growth and free cash flow.

An existing holding in Orsted AS was increased opportunistically amid rising growth concerns and higher interest rates. The Portfolio Advisor believes there is significant long-term growth opportunity in offshore wind farms.

Ross Stores Inc., Honeywell International Inc., Givaudan SA, ResMed Inc. and Eli Lilly and Co. were sold to fund other investment opportunities. CSL Ltd. was eliminated based on concerns related to plasma supply constraints driven by the pandemic. Heineken NV was sold amid concerns related to slowing growth and operating challenges. The Portfolio Advisor sold Suzuki Motor Corp. based on concerns related to environmental, social and governance issues, as well as slowing growth in India. Ashtead Group, DSV AS and Alphabet Inc. were trimmed based on share price strength.

Recent Developments

Effective September 1, 2021, CAMI, as manager, will pay the Fund's operating expenses, other than certain expenses, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of an annual fixed rate administration fee. This fee will apply to all of the Fund's classes, other than Class O, and will be equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each class of the Fund.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions imposed by governments around the world to limit its spread have disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect the performance of the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*. As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

CAMI generally delegates trading and execution authority to the portfolio sub-advisors and does not, in its capacity as portfolio advisor, receive any goods or services directly through soft dollar arrangements.

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors when they process trades through them (referred to in the industry as "soft-dollar" arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$6,486 to CIBC WM; the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (referred to as the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;

- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (referred to as *inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended August 31, 2021. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

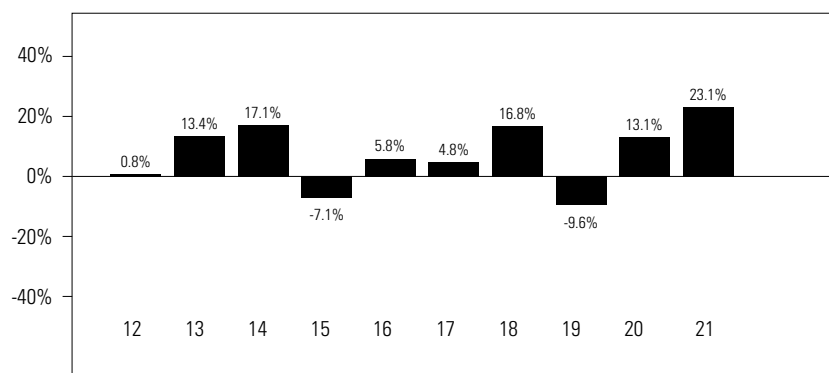

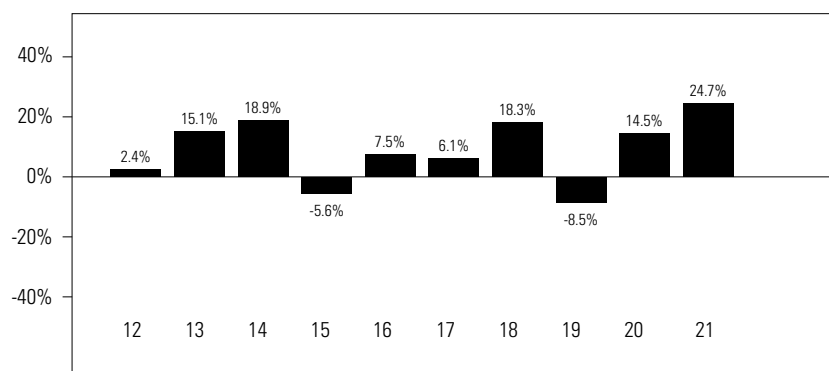
Year-by-Year Returns

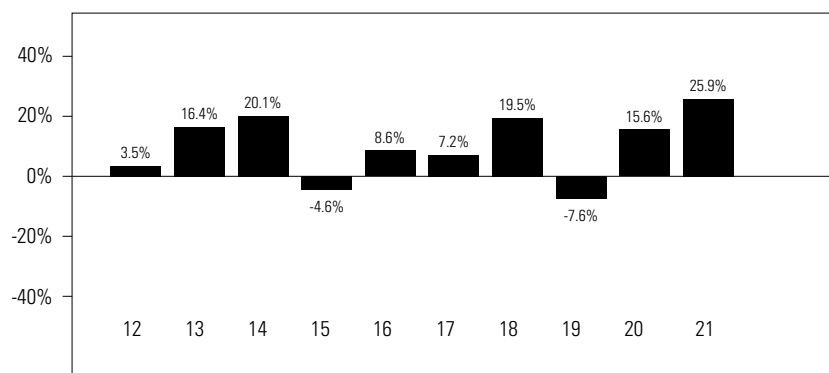
Class A Units
