Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

CIBC Core Plus Fixed Income Pool's (referred to as the *Pool*) Portfolio Advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI*, the *Manager* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The Pool invests primarily in other mutual funds and exchange-traded funds (referred to individually, as an *Underlying Fund*, and collectively, as the *Underlying Funds*) which can be found in the Top Positions table of the Summary of Investment Portfolio.

The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the six-month period ended February 28, 2022. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value decreased by 10% during the period, from \$478,709 as at August 31, 2021 to \$428,637 as at February 28, 2022. Net redemptions of \$30,332 and negative investment performance resulted in an overall decrease in net asset value.

Series A units of the Pool posted a return of -4.2% for the period. The Pool's benchmark, the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index (referred to as the benchmark), returned -4.0% for the same period. The Pool's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of the other series of units offered by the Pool.

The Pool has a target asset allocation of 14% short-term debt, 48% Canadian, global government and corporate debt, 19% high-yield debt and 19% emerging markets debt and currency.

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to be a major influence on the global economy and on financial markets during the period. With the emergence of COVID-19 vaccines, global financial markets reopened, supporting above-trend growth and inflation. This also caused interest rates to rise throughout 2021. With vaccination campaigns that were relatively successful (depending on the country), each successive wave of infection proved to have less impact on economic activity.

The unemployment rate declined as the Canadian economy added jobs. Still, there was some volatility in the labour market as the COVID-19 Omicron variant led to another round of lockdown restrictions, eliminating some jobs. Inflation surged to levels not seen

since 1991 as supply-chain challenges and strong demand helped lift prices. Energy, food and shelter were all major contributors to higher inflation. Economic sanctions imposed on Russia following its invasion of Ukraine also contributed to sharply rising prices, particularly for energy.

In the second half of 2021, central banks expressed heightened concerns that inflation was proving to be more persistent than previously expected. The surge in global inflation forced many central banks to bring forward interest rate increases. The European Central Bank announced a gradual reduction of monetary policy stimulus through its asset-purchase programs. The Bank of England raised its bank rate on two separate occasions, to 0.5%. Many emerging markets central banks raised interest rates amid growing inflationary pressures. Among those to raise interest rates were Brazil, Mexico and Hungary.

The Bank of Canada (referred to as the *BoC*) held its benchmark overnight interest rate steady at 0.25%, believing the Canadian economy still warranted monetary support. But the BoC did end its bond purchasing program, which was initiated at the onset of the pandemic. With inflation running at elevated levels, the BoC suggested that it might raise interest rates in the middle of 2022 to help rising tame consumer prices.

The U.S. Federal Reserve Board (referred to as the *Fed*) held the target range for its federal funds rate steady at 0.00%–0.25%. Toward the middle of the period, the Fed acknowledged that inflation might not be transitory, and appropriate action might need to be taken to slow the growth in consumer prices. The Fed began to taper its bond-purchase program, with plans to end its quantitative-easing program sometime in the first half of 2022.

In the latter half of 2021, yield curves flattened as short-term bond yields rose sharply. Investors were adjusting to the BoC and Fed setting the stage for interest rate increases in 2022. However, long-term yields declined in the fourth quarter of 2021. Some analysts cited concerns over a possible central bank policy error, in which interest rate increases happen too soon or too fast.

The uncertainty of the extent of central bank actions, coupled with the Russia-Ukraine conflict, saw credit spreads (the yield differential

between securities of similar maturity but differing credit quality) rise in early 2022. In addition, sectors posted negative returns. The corporate sector was the worst performer, followed by the provincial sector, with Government of Canada bonds performing the best.

Horizons Absolute Return Global Currency ETF, Renaissance High-Yield Bond Fund and iShares JP Morgan Corporate Bond ETF detracted from the Pool's performance.

Renaissance Flexible Yield Fund and Renaissance Global Bond Private Pool contributed to the Pool's performance.

Recent Developments

The escalating conflict between Ukraine and the Russian Federation has resulted in significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses, financial markets, and the Pool's performance. While the situation remains fluid, the Pool continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions imposed by governments around the world to limit its spread have disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect the performance of the Pool.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Pool, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Pool

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Pool's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Pool's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective series of units of the Pool as described in *Management Fees*.

The Manager pays the Pool's operating expenses (other than certain Pool costs) in respect of Series A, Series F, Series S and ETF Series units, which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Pool paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with respect to those series of units. For Series O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Pool's operating expenses (other than certain Pool costs) allocated to Series O units of the Pool. The fixed administration fee payable by the Pool, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Pool.

As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Pool's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders.

As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Pool.

CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Pool. From time to time, CAMI as Portfolio Advisor may invest in units of the Pool on behalf of other investment pools.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Pool to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Pool. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Pool to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor makes decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Pool. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor when it processes trades through them (referred to in the industry as "soft-dollar" arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor with investment decision-making services for the Pool or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Pool. As per the terms of the portfolio advisory agreement, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Pool. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Pool.

During the period, the Pool paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$13,364 to CIBC WM; the Pool did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Pool Transactions

The Pool may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the

standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (referred to as the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to the Portfolio Advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment pool or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (referred to as *inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment pool managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Pool, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Pool (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Pool and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Pool including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Pool are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Pool during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Pool, including securities lending, pool accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such

servicing fees are paid by the Manager. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Pool pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Pool. Management fees are based on the Pool's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, and trailing commissions are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Pool. The Pool is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each series of units.

For Series O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Series O management fee will not exceed the Series F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Pool for the period ended February 28, 2022. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

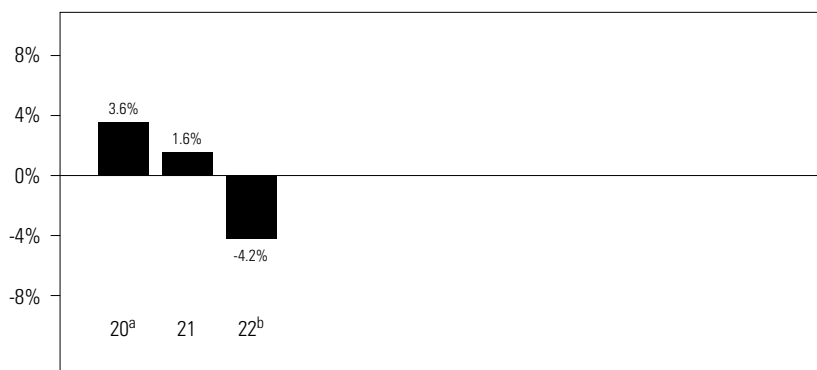

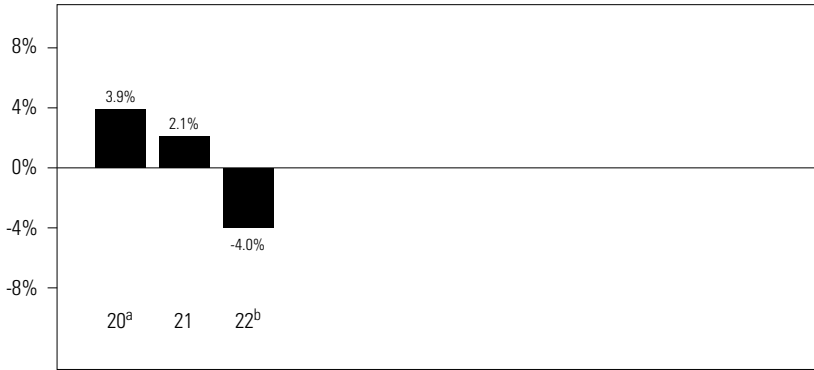
Series A Units

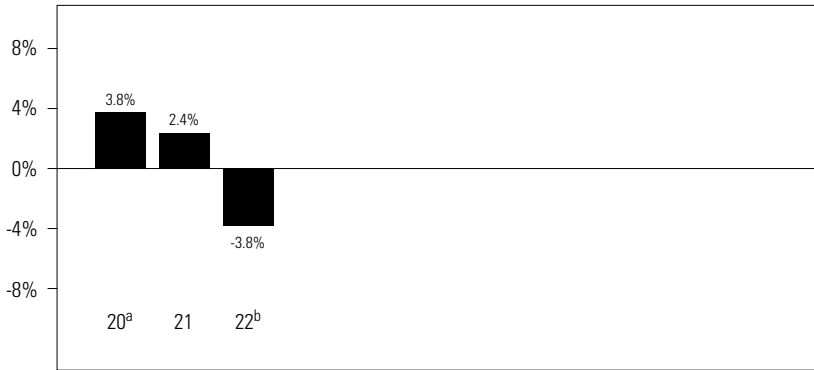
Series F Units

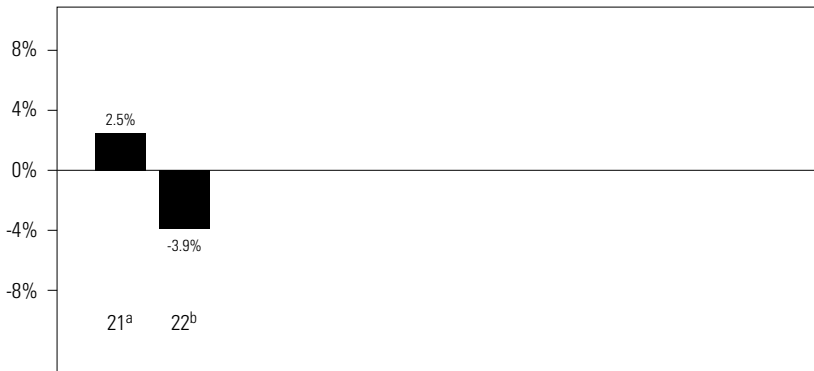
Series O Units

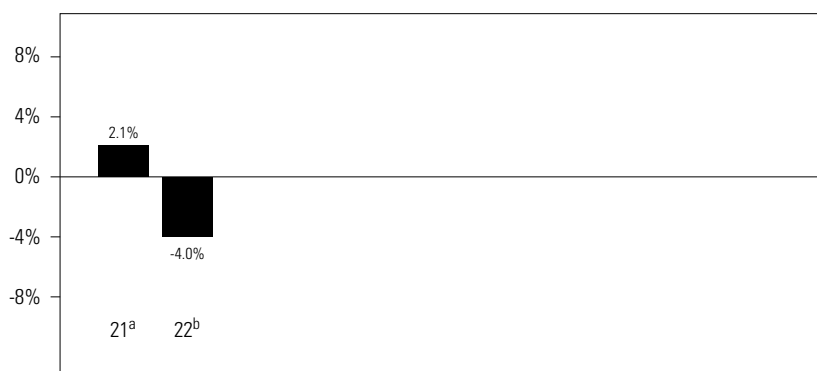
Series S Units
