Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

Renaissance Canadian Growth Fund's (referred to as the *Fund*) Portfolio Advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI*, the *Manager* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the six-month period ended February 28, 2022. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 2% during the period, from \$1,136,425 as at August 31, 2021 to \$1,157,809 as at February 28, 2022. Net sales of \$1,106 and positive investment performance resulted in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 0.8% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index (referred to as the *benchmark*), returned 4.0% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

Investor sentiment shifted following the outperformance of value-oriented stocks relative to growth stocks. The shift was driven by investors' expectations of interest rate increases by central banks. Volatility in financial markets during the latter part of the period was caused by geopolitical concerns following Russian aggression toward Ukraine. This put added pressure on riskier assets and growth stocks in particular. Additionally, geopolitical worries placed further pressure on energy prices that were already elevated amid increasing global demand and tight global supply.

Stock selection within the information technology and financials sectors detracted from the Fund's performance. A moderate underweight allocation to the materials sector and an overweight exposure to the biotechnology industry also detracted from performance.

A significant overweight holding in Dye & Durham Ltd. detracted from the Fund's performance. The company experienced a failed take-private bid and faced regulatory risks around two proposed acquisitions in the U.K. and Australia. A moderate overweight holding in Nuvei Corp. was another detractor from performance. The high-growth company was caught in the "valuation squeeze"

experienced by many companies with similar growth characteristics. Other individual detractors from performance included holdings in Mersana Therapeutics Inc., Lightspeed Commerce Inc. and Deciphera Pharmaceuticals Inc.

Stock selection within the energy sector contributed to the Fund's performance. A moderate underweight exposure to the information technology sector and significant overweight exposure to the financials sector also contributed to performance, as did an underweight exposure to the medical devices and tools industry.

The Fund's significant overweight allocation to energy producers, including holdings in Tourmaline Oil Corp., Canadian Natural Resources Ltd. and Cenovus Energy Inc., contributed to performance. All three companies benefited from rising commodity prices, strong operating fundamentals and inexpensive starting valuations. A significant overweight holding in CVS Health Corp. contributed to performance, as the company continued to deliver on its mergers-and-acquisitions synergies.

The Portfolio Advisor added a new holding in Andlauer Healthcare Group Inc. after the company announced two acquisitions in the U.S. The Portfolio Advisor believes this creates a new growth avenue in the U.S. that should support its premium valuation. The Portfolio Advisor added Definity Financial Corp. to the Fund by participating in its initial public offering (referred to as *IPO*). The company has been operating in Canada for 150 years in property and casualty insurance, with approximately 4.6% of market share. The IPO facilitated a demutualization process for the company (paying out policy holders with IPO proceeds). A new holding in Revance Therapeutics Inc. was purchased given its positive outlook for the next 12 to 18 months of its long-acting neurotoxin and the potential for advancement of a Botox biosimilar program.

A holding in Canadian Pacific Railway Ltd. was increased as the company moved closer to its transformational acquisition of Kansas City Southern Industries Inc. An existing overweight holding in Bank of Montreal was increased. The bank has considerable operating momentum behind it, with a high excess-capital level that can be used for dividend growth. TELUS International (CDA) Inc. was increased as

well for its high-growth, high-quality attributes. A holding in Nuvei was increased as the company issued equity in conjunction with its U.S. IPO. The Portfolio Advisor added Apple Inc. and Amazon.com Inc. to reduce benchmark risk.

A holding in Canadian Apartment Properties REIT was eliminated in favour of energy holdings in Cenovus Energy and Suncor Energy Inc. The shift was made to increase the Fund's growth characteristics and overall yield. Canadian Tire Corp. Ltd. was eliminated given increased retail risk related to higher labour costs and supply-chain issues. The proceeds were directed into a holding in Waste Connections Inc. Marvel Biosciences Corp. was eliminated from the Fund following strong performance and stock trading at historical high multiples. Sea Ltd. was sold given rapidly increasing questions around the company's capital allocation priorities given expansion into new regions for e-commerce.

The Portfolio Advisor shifted some of the Fund's weighting from Shaw Communications Inc. into Rogers Communications Inc. The latter stock is currently trading at the highest discount compared to its peers in over a decade, after the recent departure of its CFO. Some of the Fund's materials sector exposure was shifted from First Quantum Minerals Ltd. into Teck Resources Ltd. The Portfolio Advisor sees more potential catalysts coming for Teck Resources, including the completion of Quebrada Blanca Phase 2 and a likely upcoming special dividend.

Recent Developments

The escalating conflict between Ukraine and the Russian Federation has resulted in significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses, financial markets, and the Fund's performance. While the situation remains fluid, the Fund continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

Effective September 1, 2021, CAMI, as Manager, pays the Fund's operating expenses, other than certain expenses, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed administration fee. This fee applies to all of the Fund's classes, other than Class O, and is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each class of the Fund.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions imposed by governments around the world to limit its spread have disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect the performance of the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*.

The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) in respect of the classes of units of the Fund (except Class O unit), which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Fund paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with respect to those classes of units. For Class O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) allocated to Class O units of the Fund. The fixed administration fee payable by the Fund, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Fund.

As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

CAMI generally delegates trading and execution authority to the portfolio sub-advisors and does not, in its capacity as portfolio advisor, receive any goods or services directly through soft dollar arrangements.

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio

Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors when they process trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$49,989 to CIBC WM and \$10,064 to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the Independent Review Committee (referred to as the *IRC*):

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer* or the *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the Private Placement Relief Order and the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from, or sell them to, a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a related party is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate (referred to as *inter-fund trades* or *cross-trades*); and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with

conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisors are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended February 28, 2022. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

Past Performance

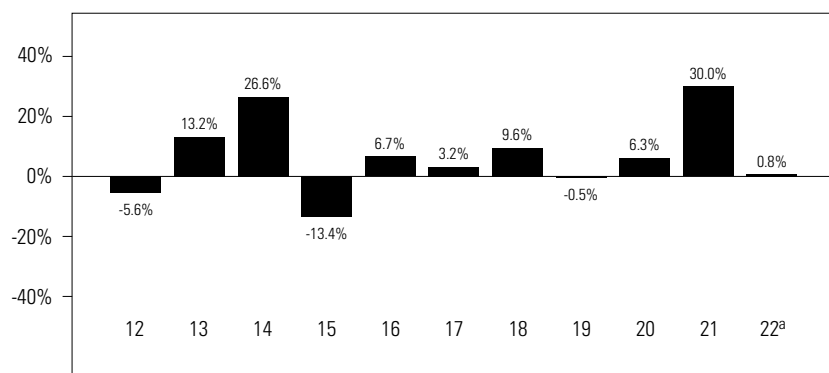

Year-by-Year Returns

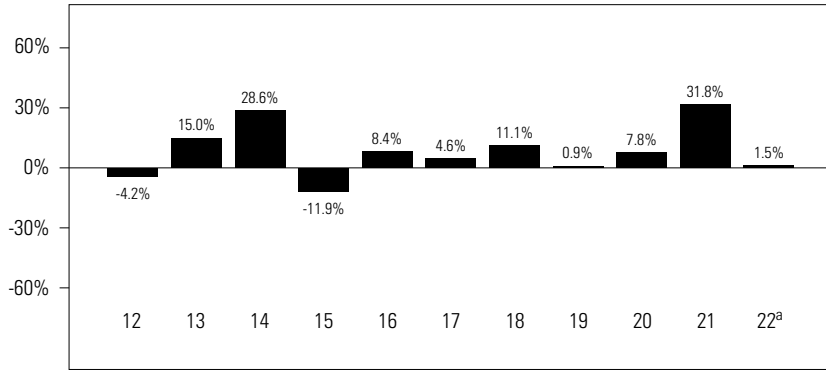

Class A Units



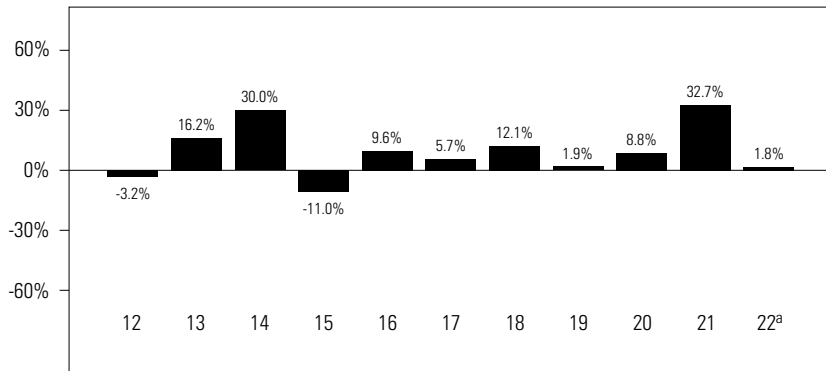
